Dear Ones,

“These all look to you, to give them their food in due season. When you give it to them, they gather it up; when you open your hand, they are filled with good things... I will sing to the Lord as long as I live; I will sing praise to my God while I have being.” - Psalm 104:27-28, 33

What a beautiful picture of God’s great care for His creation! “These all look to you...” I can’t help but be in awe of the wonderfully gracious God we have as I hear these words and think of all that He does for me and for each of us. And then think about the response it elicits in us. If only we lived our lives as the Psalmist describes.

I encourage you sometime during the month of November, before Thanksgiving, to take some time and read and reflect on Psalm 104. As you do that think of all that God has done for you and continues to do. Think of all His promises and how He has kept them.

The Psalmist paints a beautiful picture of that loving relationship for us. God is the One Who creates and preserves us. The writer of this psalm begins by reminding us of God’s great glory in creating all that is and ever will be. There are no limits to what our God can do. We can only perceive a portion of all of it. God empowers all that is and sets the boundaries around it. What a magnificent God we have.

The psalmist brings in the enormity of what our God has done in creation and the grandeur in which it has been done. It is beyond anything we could ever imagine, and God deserves our thanks and praise for it.

But those words, the response of creation to God’s gracious care, keep coming back to me, “These all look to you...” As creation sees our God it sees God’s good gifts, we must realize we are the creatures and God is the Creator. We are totally dependent on God and God’s care – which will never disappoint us.

Again, heading into Thanksgiving, stop and think about God’s great care, where you “look to God,” where you “stretch out your hand” and where God fills you “with good things.”

Dear Friends in Christ,

It is hard to believe that in just a few weeks we will begin the season of Advent. What doesn't help is that the first Sunday in Advent is in November; in fact, just 2 days after Thanksgiving! It skews our internal clocks as it just seems natural that the preparatory season before Christmas is supposed to take place in December. Think of all the Advent calendars – they start with December 1!

Also this year is one of the years that Christmas actually falls on a Sunday – so it makes the Advent almost seem a little shorter in some ways! (At least to me!) Because of Christmas falling on a Sunday, it seems like we are celebrating March to the Manger really early. Since I have been your pastor, it has always been on the 3rd Sunday of Advent – this year that will be Dec. 11. We will again do it during worship on Sunday morning and then have our “Outdoor March” that evening.

Services for Christmas Eve will be at 6:30 PM, Dec. 24th (Saturday night). Christmas Day and New Year's there will be NO SUNDAY SCHOOL or fellowship times. Worship services at regular time - 9:30AM. There will be more information on these specific services a little later!

For our Advent Sermon series this year we will walk through the 2nd chapter of Luke, as well as some Old Testament and Epistle passages, and look at the key verses that remind us that Christ has come to each one of us. Each week will focus on a different word from the reading that highlights what happened then and how that word applies to our lives today.

In Week 1, we celebrate that we are registered as children of God through Christ. Our scriptures will be: Numbers 1:1-4, 17-19, Revelation 7:9-12, and Luke 10:17-20. The sermon is “Count on It.”

In Week 2, we celebrate that we are part of God's lineage through Christ. The scriptures are 2 Samuel 7:4-5, 12-16, Galatians 4:4-7, and Matthew 1:18-23. The sermon is “Royal Lineage.”

In Week 3, we celebrate that we have great joy because of Christ. Isaiah 55:10-13, Philippians 4:4-7, and Luke 2:8-10 are the scriptures and the sermon is “Great Joy.”

In Week 4, we celebrate that it is the firstborn Son of God who was born for us. We will be using Exodus 13:11-16, Colossians 1:15-20, and Luke 2:6-7. The sermon is "Firstborn."

Christmas Eve - On this holy night, we will celebrate Holy Communion and sing along with the angels, "Glory to God in the highest," for the birth of our Savior among us.

Christmas Day - On this blessed day, we will celebrate the good news that the Baby Jesus has arrived.

It is during the season of Advent we learn to see light in the darkness, to know that Christ is near us even when, or especially when, we feel otherwise. God in Christ chose to become part of our lives, and in Christ's death and resurrection, has promised to give us new life.

As we enter Advent be reminded of Mary's song of praise to God -- that our souls are to magnify God and our spirits are to rejoice in God our Savior (Luke 1).

Wishing you a time of prayer and preparation in this season, as well as a peaceful time of Christmas, and a hopeful New Year.



REMEMBERING SEVILLA PURKEY



There has been a change to the Fellowship Hall entrance. New tinted glass doors have been installed in place of the nearly 50-year-old glass ones. Once completely installed, these doors will allow handicap accessibility at the front of the church.

The new doors were made possible by of a bequest from Sevilla Purkey. Sevilla passed away in Texas, September 2019. The church received the bequest in 2020 and the Church Board decided to wait for a project that Sevilla would have wanted to support.

Sevilla was a great supporter of the church being accessible to all. Even after she moved to Texas to be closer to her daughter, she sent a monthly check to fulfill her pledge to the Accessibility Renovation Project (ARP). ARP made it possible for the church to build the elevator and handicap accessible bathrooms in 2014.

Bequests are gifts that are made as part of a will or trust. A bequest can be to a person, or it can be a charitable bequest to a nonprofit organization, trust or foundation. Anyone can make a bequest—in any amount—to an individual or charity.

Making a snack or meal that would be from your “vacation place” could be fun to pretend you are there.

ADVENT BLESSINGS

Advent is the beginning of the church year for Christians. During Advent, we prepare for and anticipate the coming of Christ: the promised coming of the Messiah to the Jews, the coming of Jesus being born in Bethlehem, the promised return of the risen Christ in final victory, and the continual coming of Christ into the lives and hearts of believers. We remember the longing of Jews for a Messiah and our own longing for and need of forgiveness, salvation and a new beginning.

The season of Advent is made up of the four Sundays that precede Christmas Day. This year, Christmas is on a Sunday, Advent will begin on Nov. 27 and last four full weeks.

Advent is a season rich in tradition, symbolism, art, music, and liturgical practice. It has its own unique themes as well as those that point the way to Christmas. Advent began in France in the fourth century. In various times and locations of the church, it has been observed for three, four, and six weeks leading to Christmas.

The color for Advent has traditionally been purple, although some churches, like Lebanon First, have adopted blue. The United Methodist Book of Worship upholds the traditional color of purple for Advent, signifying penitence and royalty, but also allows blue, the color of hope.

For each Sunday in Advent we light a candle on our Advent Wreath to mark the day. There are four candles, one for each Sunday and each having a special meaning, Love, Hope, Joy and Peace.

Over the years, people have used various ways to count down the days of Advent. Advent calendars with little candies or toys have become popular. This year for Advent, you are encouraged to participate in a "Reverse Advent Calendar." It will benefit the Matthew 25:40 Ministries Food Pantry. The idea is to give a food item for each day of Advent. Each Sunday during Advent, bring what you have gathered for that week and place it at the altar. As it is said, "It is more blessed to give, than to receive." What a blessing this will be for those in need.



Here are the Trustees recent happenings:

The Fellowship Hall entrance door is in the process of being installed. We are working on the electrical installation to make it

handicap accessible, along with the door's security system.

Replacements were made at the parsonage in regards to a toilet and the refrigerator ice maker.

507 St. Louis Rental (KC) repairs caused by the water leak have been 95% completed. Still need to find a matching ceiling LED light. The tenants are happy with the repair. New bushes have been planted in the front of the home and will be watered as needed. The plumber has agreed to pay for any costs associated with the water damage.

The yearly Trustee reports to the annual Charge Conference have been submitted including the parsonage inspection.

Vinyl molding has been reapplied in the downstairs hallway.

Coming attractions:

We are researching the financial cost to add an awning over the new door to help protect it from the weather.

We are experiencing water in the basement at the front of our building. "Flower Room" repair still in progress.

Now that the heat has been turned on, we will proceed to do more research on how to improve the radiator heat in the downstairs far east bathroom.

Parsonage inspection highlighted the need to repair one burner on the stove or replace it.

As always, we are blessed to be working with so many great trustees, and other church member volunteers, that assist in maintaining our church property. It is a wonderful group of people. My many thanks! erwj




